We also provide countless opportunities and experiences for our pupils to become involved in charity work, both locally and globally.

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We maintain positive links with our partner primary schools and schools within the Area Learning Community, operating a Sixth Form Partnership with St. Genevieve's High School, all of which further enriches our curriculum, extra-curricular activities and career opportunities for the pupils.

A key component of our School Development Plan is our drive towards the establishment of De La Salle as a Digital Learning School Community.

The school has invested significantly in Digital Technologies, working in partnership with C2K and other digital providers to further update our facilities and develop specialist staff and resources.

De La Salle sees Information Technology as a core aspect of our pupils' development and we have extended the spectrum of choices for our pupils, introducing additional digital and online learning forums to enhance their acquisition of advanced technological skills.

We have been collaborating with industry and business to introduce higher level apprenticeships and secure recognised awards that provide career enhancement in new and emergent technologies and future workplaces.

De La Salle College is an integral part of the wider local community. We serve that community not only through the education of the pupils of the area, but by sharing our resources with the local community, in particular, our Sports Complex and facilities. The College benefits greatly from the support that the community gives and we look forward to this relationship continuing and growing.

SCHOOL

In September 2008, after twenty years of operating on two sites, the brand new purpose built De La Salle College was opened. It remains one of the most up to date schools in the north of Ireland with modern fully equipped classrooms, laboratories and workshops. Additional funding was secured at that time to allow a double sized sports hall to be built alongside the gymnasium and the weights and fitness rooms. Outdoor pitches at St Genevieve's are also currently used for PE classes and extracurricular activities on our brand new 3G pitch and pavilion beside the school.

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BUILDING

The school also includes the beautiful chapel of St Jean Baptiste de la Salle and modern facilities for the Home Economics, Technology, Music and Drama departments. Recently, we were able to invest over £200,000 in a complete refresh of all our C2K networked PCs. De La Salle College is now in the enviable position where we can boast ten suites of networked PCs and four Apple Mac suites, in addition to portable devices such as laptops, chrome books and iPads. We have a Bring Your Own Device policy for Key Stage 5 students. We believe we have an infrastructure capable of meeting the needs of 21st century education.















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HISTORY OF DE LA

As the population in the Andersonstown area in the early 1960s surged, Fr. Cunningham decided that a new boys' Secondary School was required in the area. To achieve his objective, he approached the De La Salle Brothers, asking them to establish a Secondary Intermediate School for the local parishes. However, finance was the main problem with only 65% of the Capital cost being funded by the state, leaving £90,000 to be funded by the parishes themselves. The local community ensured the funds were raised and gave the community parishes a financial and emotional stake in the school. In naming the school the Brothers ensured that the school would possess the qualities which mark the Lasallian educational ethos. The new La Salle Boys' Secondary School and its sister school, St. Genevieve's, opened their doors to its first pupils in September 1966.

The first Principal was Brother Cornelius who was to pioneer the school through the difficult early years of the Troubles with unparalleled success. These early years coincided with the breakdown of order in the North and the school was to serve as a refugee centre for those fleeing the violence in the Lower Falls. The new school year in September 1969 was delayed by seven weeks as a result and these circumstances were repeated in 1972 when part of the school was occupied by the British Army; in the same year the school gymnasium was destroyed in an explosion. Despite such obstacles, the resilience and abilities of both staff and pupils alike was demonstrated by the outstanding 'O Level' results of 1971. This success led to the ground-breaking decision to create 'A Level' classes in La Salle and ultimately to establish the treasured consortium with St. Genevieve's. The following years saw this academic success consolidated and with strong provision being made for those with other talents, La Salle was now visibly "a place of opportunity" for all.

The primary challenge confronting the new Principal, Brother Dominic, in 1977 was how to manage the increasing number of students seeking admission to the school. The building was originally designed for 450-500 students but by the early 1980s it was approaching 1,200. In the main this was achieved by the use of mobile classrooms which encroached on the running track and tennis courts further reducing the sports facilities available to our students.

In 1989 the Junior students moved to the vacant Cross and Passion College building on the Glen Road. While this relieved some of the pressures on the Edenmore Drive site it presented new logistical and financial challenges associated with a split site. This supposedly short term arrangement was to last almost two decades as a constant battle to achieve a new school was waged. Brother Francis who succeeded Brother Dominic in 1987 provided steady leadership consistent with the Lasallian tradition throughout this era as we moved towards the new millennium.



SALLE COLLEGE

1999 saw the first lay Principal appointed. Dr Aidan Hamill presided over a number of key changes in the school. Our SEN provision was extended significantly and became increasingly specialised. 2006 witnessed the culmination of the long pursuit of the McLarnon Cup in Gaelic Football at Senior level while many of the same cohort of players were central to annexing an unprecedented U18 treble in the Soccer competitions. Dr. Hamill also championed the delivery of the long awaited new school building.

The new school was officially opened in 2008 with Mr Paul Barry as Principal and he continued the traditions that were well established by his predecessors. Examination outcomes continued to rise as the benefits of our new facilities were seized upon by teachers determined to achieve the best for the students in their care.

Mrs Claire White took over as Principal in 2014. Working with the staff, Mrs White preserved the best and distinctiveness of what already existed in De La Salle College and continues to make educational improvements for the benefit of the College.

Education outside the classroom is one of the great La Salle traditions and our extra-curricular focus was in evidence from the beginning. Student horizons were (and continue to be) lifted beyond West Belfast as students experienced educational visits to Kilkenny, Barcelona, Rome, London, Berlin, Krakow, Paris, Boston, Ethiopia and Dublin as well as skiing and water sports trips to France, Bulgaria, Austria and the USA.

The La Salle show, with its first production in 1969, is renowned throughout the community. It is a significant source of pride that many famous actors first trod the boards in our school show. The nurturing of special talents like the actors above is a priority as well as an area of expertise.

Three past pupils, twins Paul and Eamon McCrory along with Ryan Magee, won coveted places at Oxford University with Ryan becoming President of the Oxford Law Society. In sport past pupils have gained international honours in athletics, basketball, boxing and soccer. One of these, Philip Mulryne has recently added to our cherished record as the school with the highest number of ordinations to the priesthood in the North.

There is one other unique aspect of the history of La Salle that says more about the school than any other. The Lasallian desire to serve our local community has resulted in over twenty past pupils returning to full time teaching posts in the school. That fact stands as a testament to the impact La Salle has on its students. If you ask them the reason for this ambition they will all emphasise the same thing – ethos. The Lasallian commitment to excellence for all in a school that is a 'place of opportunity' resonates with every single one of us. It is the glue that binds every member of the school community.

Our history is unique but it is only important with regard to how it informs and shapes our future.











YEAR 8 TRANSITION

In De La Salle College we understand the transition from Primary 7 to Year 8 can be daunting for our new pupils and parents. We make significant efforts to make the transition as smooth and successful as possible. We begin our journey to get to know each individual pupil before they arrive in the school through successful and established links with our feeder primary schools. We complete baseline testing before arrival and try to effectively ensure that all classes have an equal mix of ability.

Key personnel will support your son as he completes the Year 8 Transition Programme including his Form Teacher, the Classroom Assistant, a Sixth Form Mentor and the Year Head who has overall pastoral responsibility for your son and will stay with him throughout the early years of his life in De La Salle.

You will attend a meeting with your son's Form Teacher at the beginning of the school year and they will endeavour to nurture and support your son during his induction period and throughout his first year in De La Salle.



PASTORAL CARE

De La Salle College is a Catholic School deriving its educational philosophy from Saint Jean Baptiste de La Salle. As a Lasallian school, we have a special mission to nurture and support our most vulnerable students. In keeping with this philosophy we welcome boys of all abilities. De La Salle is a place of opportunity where we believe that the hidden ingredient to our success is the care and support we give to every single boy. Your son is an individual with unique talents and abilities and, likewise, unique needs, and so we work in partnership with our parents and a range of other support agencies (including our Student Chaplaincy Team and counsellors) in providing for the spiritual, moral, social, emotional and cultural development of your son to ensure his academic achievement and personal development.

Our Pastoral system is integrated into school life and underpins the academic progress of your son. Each Form Class from Year 8 – 14 has a designated Form Teacher. Each Year Group has a Head of Year who leads the team of Form Teachers from Year 8 – Year 14. Each Head of Year is supported by a Key Stage Manager and Pastoral Vice Principal who, in turn, is supported by the Principal. The Form Teacher is a pivotal role in our Pastoral Structure as these teachers develop a special relationship in supporting your son as he progresses through the school year.





LEARNING SUPPORT DEPARTMENT

De La Salle College's Special Educational Needs (SEN) Policy reflects the Lasallian ethos of welcome and inclusion and it provides the framework that ensures that children with SEN experience opportunities for success in order to achieve their full potential whilst allowing pupils to develop the knowledge, skills and confidence needed in adult life. Our Learning Support Department, comprising of the SENCO, Deputy SENCO, Specialist Teachers and a team of highly committed classroom assistant staff, work in collaboration with our supportive parents/carers and the expert services provided by a variety of external agency staff such as St Gerard's, PPBSP, Autism Advisory Intervention Services, Belfast Education Authority's Hearing and Vision Sensory Support, Careers, Education Psychology, Family Works, EA Transition Officer, YEHA, and Intercultural Education Service.

SPECIALIST RESOURCE CLASSES AT KS3 & KS4

Eight specialist resource classes have been developed within the College. The pupils hold Statements of Educational Need. Pupils enjoy high quality small group teaching, with fulltime classroom assistant support, in a specially equipped nurturing space. This space has access to dimmed lighting, black out curtains, interactive whiteboard, ICT facilities, sensory bubble lighting, sensory equipment and a social space.





CHILD PROTECTION AND SAFEGUARDING

De La Salle College is committed to taking all possible measures to ensure the safety and the physical, emotional, and moral wellbeing of the pupils. We seek to establish and maintain an environment where children feel secure, are encouraged to talk, and are listened to. We ensure children know that there are adults in the school who they can approach if they are worried. We include opportunities within the taught curriculum for children to develop the skills they need to recognise and stay safe from abuse and through a pastorally led preventative curriculum. Safer children make more successful learners.

The Designated Teacher for Child Protection is Ms Marian O'Neill. She is supported by a Designated Child Protection Team.

The school has a Pupil Welfare Officer. The Pupil Welfare Officer (PWO) resides in the Medical Room beside the school office. The PWO is First Aid trained and is also supported by trained First Aid staff.

The Pupil We fare Officer has a valuable role to play in providing a support service for students, whose responsibilities include overseeing medication procedures, dealing with illness, injury and emotional wellbeing.

PUPIL WELFARE

COUNSELLING SUPPORT

A Counselling support service is available in the College throughout the week.

Pupils can be referred by their parent/carer, a member of staff, an external agency or through self-referral. Counselling provides a specialist support where a pupil has the chance to be listened to in a welcoming and friendly environment.

Counselling gives pupils the opportunity to talk through social, emotional, behavioural difficulties and their personal journey in a safe, caring and supportive space.

Confidentiality is crucial to empower pupils to be able to tell their story. The counsellors are aware of the need to sometimes step outside confidentiality and will only do so if there is a concern of a safeguarding nature. This will be discerned carefully and in consultation with the designated teacher for Child Protection.

Counselling helps our pupils to make positive and transformative changes in their lives.

PREVENTATIVE CURRICULUM

The 'Preventative Curriculum' denotes the proactive promotion of the positive emotional health and wellbeing of pupils. Personal Development classes encourage the pupils to develop their social, physical, emotional and cognitive health in a safe and respectful environment.

An extensive programme of speakers and workshops for pupils in all year groups is organised to help promote the positive emotional health and wellbeing of pupils.



ANTI-BULLYING

We recognise the importance of providing an educational environment that is safe, secure and free from bullying in order to maximise the full potential of the pupils who attend De La Salle College. We are completely opposed to bullying and will not tolerate it. We aim to promote an anti-bullying culture among all members of our school community. If there is a concern of a bullying nature, it will be dealt with promptly and sensitively by the Head of Year and Pastoral Team.

MERIT SYSTEM

An important part of the pastoral programme is our system of awards, whereby effort and achievement in any facet of College life are rewarded. Your son is left in no doubt that we consider him to be an important person in his own right. 'The 5 Core Principles of Lasallian Education' underpins our Merit System whereby pupils can obtain a merit for various achievements from 'Excellent homework', Excellent classwork' or 'Excellent Attendance' to 'Helping Others' and 'Caring for Peers'. Various reward activities and trips are organised at subject teacher, form teacher and Head of Year level.



STUDENT COUNCIL

The School Council represents the student voice in De La Salle College. Pupils from each year group work together to ensure there is a truly inclusive community where everyone feels valued and supported. The council have regular meetings where everyone's opinion is listened to and taken on board. Important issues impacting on pupil wellbeing, experience and provision are discussed to inform our way of life within the college.

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DE LA SALLE COLLEGE: A WELLBEING SCHOOL

In De La Salle College, children and young people's mental health and emotional wellbeing is a central focus of our pastoral care programme.

Our Transitional Action Plan sets out our vision for a Wellbeing School; educating pupils, staff and parents about how they can maintain positive wellbeing across the whole school community.

By promoting positive mental health, pupils develop skills and resilience techniques to cope with everyday challenges throughout their school years and beyond into adulthood based on the 8 key principles of wellbeing.



THE 8 KEY PRINCIPLES OF WELLBEING.

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1. Leadership & management that supports and champions efforts to promote emotional health and wellbeing

Governors, Principal and Senior Leaders have a shared strategic vision and commitment to promoting the social and emotional wellbeing of our children and young people and across the school community.

2. An ethos and environment that is safe and secure which supports, respects and values diversity

Positive behaviour management as reflected in the implementation of the 'La Salle Way' encompassing a restorative model in promoting the development of social and emotional skills.

3. Curriculum, Teaching & Learning to promote resilience and emotional and social learning

Delivery of a preventative curriculum via weekly tutorials based on TAKE5 Programme for positive mental health and resilience complimented by an extensive Enrichment and Extracurricular programmes to encourage participation and development of Leadership, Sporting, Cultural, Creative, entrepreneurial skills

4. Enabling student voice to influence decision-making

Students have regular opportunities to influence decisions, to express their views and to develop strong social networks, participation in pupil surveys, focus groups, Student Council and Rights Respecting Schools Initiatives.

5. Investment in staff development; building expertise and capacity to support their own wellbeing and that of pupils
All staff benefit from a wellbeing programme of training and development to increase their knowledge of emotional wellbeing and to equip them to be able to identify mental health difficulties in their students.

6. Identifying need and monitoring impact of interventions

Use of Pupil Attitudes to School Survey (PASS) as a whole school screening tool to measure emotional wellbeing. Access to range of Tiered Assessment and Intervention Programmes to address individual, identified groups, cohorts and specialist needs within the school.

7. Working in partnership with Parents and Carers -to promote emotional health and wellbeing through

Parent education programme incorporating parenting classes delivered by range of multi-disciplinary teams. Emotional Resilience and Wellbeing Workshops helping parents to be a role model for their children regarding how they deal with setbacks and develop resilient thinking.

8. Targeted support & appropriate referral to ensure timely and effective identification of students who would benefit from access range of additional support and appropriate referral to support services.

Extensive range of links with external agencies particularly youth and community services to build and develop high-quality services to improve the emotional wellbeing and mental health of children and young people directly, supporting their families and caregivers











SPIRITUALITY

The development of Spirituality is at the heart of De La Salle College and is an important aspect of our day to day living and learning. Prayer is an integral part of the school day and, as a Lasallian school, we promote an ethos which is Gospel inspired. 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LEARNING AND TEACHING

In De La Salle College, we believe in the concept of lifelong learning. Teachers are at the cutting edge of professional development and continue striving to improve our practice. This means coming to a better understanding of the learning and teaching process and being committed to continuous professional development.

We believe that learning should be a rewarding and enjoyable experience for everyone. Through our teaching we equip our students with the knowledge, skills and understanding that will enable them to make informed choices about the important things in their lives, developing a motivated and positive disposition towards their learning. Our students demonstrate excellent critical and creative thinking skills, display high levels of self-confidence, independence and maturity and are well prepared to contribute responsibly and positively to the local and wider community.

CAREERS EDUCATION, INFORMATION, Advice and Guidance

De La Salle College gives full recognition to the values of Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG). In line with established best practice, Careers Education is delivered to Year 10-14 in discrete timetabled classes throughout the school year by a fully trained CEIAG team. In addition to the compulsory content of Education for Employability, the programmes delivered have been tailored to meet the requirements of our pupils.

Commencing in Year 10, all pupils undertake a coordinated sequence of activity-based lessons to prepare for GCSE subject choices. Pupils will learn the basic concepts of Personal Career Planning (PCP) and will explore several possible careers choices within their individual PCP. In the latter part of the year, all pupils work on basic skills for employability which compliments the Learning for Life and Work curriculum. Careers software (Xello) is used to help with career ideas and allows students to work through a programme of study. Guidance is very important at this transition point-every pupil is interviewed by a member teaching staff when it comes to making their subject choices for GCSE.

All pupils in Year 12 update their Personal Career Plan and some will plan to make applications to institutes of Further Education (FE). Pupils also receive lessons on a range of important topics such as the Qualifications Framework, Interview Skills and Labour Market Information. Pupils undertake lessons on Xello, for example the Labour Market Information and the lessons on how to effectively make the transition to Further Education. Careers Advisors from the Careers Service within the Department of the Economy interview all students in Year 12 to prepare for A-Level subject choice or FE courses. During the year, all students visit the West Belfast Area Careers Fair which is attended by employers and FE and HE providers. All students will undertake Work Experience in Year 12. This is such an important part of the year whereby pupils make links with industry.

In Sixth form, students study a diverse curriculum whereby students explore their options in FE, HE and the Higher Apprenticeship world. Students investigate their options and are encouraged to apply for their 'Plan A' and 'Plan B'. Careers advisors from the Careers Service within the Department of the Economy interview all students in Year 14 to prepare them for their post-18 choices. Students can refer themselves for guidance when they feel it is required. All Year 13 students go on Work Experience to assist them in their post-18 decision making.







DIGITAL LEARNING

KS3 IT:

De La Salle pupils continue their Information Technology development by learning a wide range of technical skills and capabilities. They will focus on desktop publishing, presentation skills, graphics design and creation, moving image production, website development, games design and creation and coding skills using Python. These transferable skills are an excellent foundation for GCSE IT and a valuable asset as a basis for all subjects at KS4 and KS5.



GCSE IT:

IT can lead to a wide range of careers and as such we provide a range of GCSE/Level 2 courses with the intention of meeting all needs.

CCEA GCSE in Digital Technology

Students acquire and apply knowledge and understanding of digital technology in a variety of contexts. They choose either Route A: Multimedia or Route B: Programming; based on this, the qualification they achieve is either GCSE Digital Technology (Multimedia) or GCSE Digital Technology (Programming). Digital technology incorporates aspects of computer science and information technology. It explores how we can use technology to create, store, process, analyse and present information in a digital context. This includes computer architecture, networks, web technology, digital media, programming tools and software applications.

OCN NI Level 2 Certificate in Information Technology

Designed to provide learners with the IT skills required to function successfully in the work and wider environment. Today's work environment depends increasingly on a range of technologies and this course provides that necessary foundation for further education and employment. This course is assessed 100% through coursework with no external exam.



POST 16 IT:

CCEA A Level in Digital Technology

Our GCE in Digital Technology is for students interested in current and emerging technologies, the impact they have and how to use them effectively. This qualification is likely to appeal to all, but it might particularly interest those who enjoyed studying digital technology, mathematics, sciences or technology & design at GCSE level or equivalent.

Cambridge Technicals in IT

The Cambridge Technicals are vocational qualifications at A level for students aged 16+. They're designed with the workplace in mind.

De La Salle has been a leading partner with OCR in delivering the Cambridge Technicals to our post 16 pupils with great success. For the past three years 100% of our A level pupils gained an A grade in their Level 3 IT.



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ONLINE LEARNING:

De La Salle prides itself on having a state of the art online learning infrastructure. We have strived to innovate in the use of digital learning tools for over a decade now. Our staff are experts in the use of digital tools such as:

- Virtual learning environments such as Google Classroom.
- Cloud Applications such as Office 365 and G Suite
- Video Conferencing applications such Microsoft Teams and Google Meet





De La Salle sees Information Technology as a core aspect of our pupils' development. We have a vision for our pupils' technological progress that tracks them from their primary schools right though to A level and beyond.



De La Salle is one of only three schools in Northern Ireland that are members of the Digital Schoolhouse initiative. The programme uniquely combines computing, fun, creativity, innovation, and industry expertise and brings them into classrooms across the country. Digital Schoolhouse is a bridge between industry and education; combining the best of both worlds to inspire students and educators to engage with computing and STEM subjects.

Members of the IT department receive specialist annual training at the Ukie head office in London. We act as a training hub for local primary schools, promoting coding through initiative interactive workshops.

RIGHTS RESPEC

De La Salle College strives to be a school where every aspect of a child is focused on and developed, including the area of wellbeing. As part of De La Salle College's Ethos Action Plan to promote a happy and successful learning community they began working towards recognition as a 'Rights Respecting School' in 2017.

The Rights Respecting Schools Award (RRSA) supports schools across the UK to embed children's rights in their ethos and culture. The award is based on principles of equality, dignity, respect, non-discrimination and participation. It recognises achievement in putting the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child at the heart of a school's practice to improve wellbeing and help all children realise their full potential. This is an award which is given to schools on behalf of UNICEF. Schools involved in the award process have reported a positive impact on behaviour, relationships and wellbeing, leading to better learning, improved academic standards and a reduction in bullying behaviour.

De La Salle College were visited in May 2019 by UNICEF Rights Respecting Schools Assessor Mr Martin Russell who awarded the school with the prestigious Silver Award saying; "The voices of young people are clearly heard and acted upon throughout the school".

Mr Russell, who spent an entire day in De La Salle, met with pupils from the Student Council, Parents, Teachers, Senior Leaders and Governors and included the following in his official Accreditation Report;

'The Principal, Chair of Governors and Senior Leaders demonstrated a passionate commitment to children's rights and explained their school mission and values is founded on their strong Lasallian culture but that this is complemented by the adoption of a rights based approach, "It's integral to our vision for the school... We want our students to focus on the person you leave here being." RRSA is seen as providing a scaffold and consistent language to enhance the school's existing vision and outlook.'
